WARD 5 HAS EXPERIENCED A TOUGH EIGHTEEN MONTHS, BUT WE'RE ABOUT TO RETURN TO NORMAL AND SOME EXCITING EVENTS.

The past 18 months have been incredibly difficult for everyone. Ward 5 has been particularly hard hit with Covid because of the huge industrial belt in the middle of the ward and around the airport. FINALLY...MCLAUGHLIN ROAD, A SCENIC ROUTE!

McLaughlin Road was once a gorgeous arch of trees that met over the road, filtering the sunlight, much like the arched roof of a cathedral. Developers built subdivisions on the west side, removing most of the trees. On the east side the 25 acre Britannia forest, part of the Britannia Farm, was owned by the Peel District School board as it is today.

The City has made several attempts to widen McLaughlin Road to four lanes - the first time in 1988. As a Trustee, I took the case to the province which resulted in the City plan being reduced to two lanes with turning lanes at intersections. That construction was rough and tumble, destroying many trees along the westerly edge of the forest.

Again in 2016 the City conducted an Environmental Assessment to widen the road, rip out another 250 trees and channel traffic into a neat by-pass of the LRT construction on Hurontario. Residents rallied at public meetings, making their opposition very clear. My colleagues on Council rejected the road widening unanimously.





Instead of heavy traffic, we are finally preserving McLaughlin and what's left of its trees as a designated Scenic Route. Our first virtual public meeting was held November 4th and as usual, our residents filled the airways with creative, positive and interesting ideas. Tree preservation was the top concern as we discussed short stone walls and plantings on the forest edge, a bicycle trail with raised, protective edging, decorative street lights, benches, raised planters and much more.

I am hoping our second consultation will be in person, with some artists' renditions so we can all visualize what our scenic route will really look like. If you would like to be informed of our next consultation, please email or phone the Ward 5 office.

EXCITING NEW MOVIE STUDIO DISTRICT IN WARD 5

Studio Bottega Inc and SIM International Partnership

While Mississauga is home to several large movie studios - the result of warehouse conversions - Studio Bottega will be the first, largest, most complete purpose-built facility in our City.

Located on 10.87 hectares (26.86 acres) at the SW corner of Derry and Hurontario, the Class A studios in two 18,000 square foot, four storey buildings will contain a total of 12 complete stages. Feature films, scripted TV series, reality TV, photo shoots and commercials will have costuming, makeup, set building and tech facilities located conveniently on the campus.

Studio Bottega will be joining a stable of SIM International facilities currently in Los Angeles, New York, Atlanta, Vancouver and Toronto. Negotiations have begun with Netflix, Amazon, Apple and Disney. Using a sports analogy, Mississauga has definitely joined the big leagues right here in Ward 5.

The benefits to Mississauga with 3,295 construction jobs(\$300m in wages and business income) 5,590 permanent positions in the arts (\$530m annual operation) and City/Gov't revenue (\$70m during construction and \$87m yearly) are outstanding.

Also significant is the commitment of the Bottega Team to partner with local educational institutions like Sheridan College to provide hands-on apprenticeships and experience in a wide variety of arts and technology fields.

TRAFFIC CALMING

In July 2021, the City of Mississauga began Automated Speed Enforcement (ASE) operations in neighbourhood school area Community Safety Zones utilizing two mobile automated speed enforcement units.

The first Ward 5 location where cameras were deployed was Morning Star Drive between Lancaster Drive and Netherwood Road in Malton.

The cameras enforced the posted 30km/h speed limit between July 5th and August 3rd. Preliminary data collected shows the average speed was reduced by more than 11 km/h on Morning Star Drive.

A total of 298 tickets were issued on Morning Star Drive. The average fine was approximately \$140 with the maximum fine issued was \$544.00.

A total of 495 tickets were issued at the first two ASE camera locations: 298 tickets at Morning Star Drive and 197 at Sawmill Valley Drive in Ward 8.

The average fine was approximately \$140.00 on Morning Star Drive and approximately \$126.00 on Sawmill Valley Drive with the maximum fines issued being \$544.00 and \$607.00 respectively.

During the month-long enforcement period, a combined 55 repeat offenders received tickets. The highest speeding ticket on Morning Star Drive was 67km/hr. More than double the posted speed limit of 30 km/h.

adaptation of the Neighbourhood Watch program, in which organized communities of business owners look out for one another, and each other's business properties.

By participating in the Watch, everyone is alert and working together to maintain safety in their respective business communities.

For details go to: https://safecitymississauga. on.ca/programs/business-watch Throughout November and January, the 20 additional cameras will continue to be deployed and begin enforcing 30 km/h speed limits around the City, with two cameras being utilized per Ward.

Cameras will be active for at least one month at each location before rotating to a new location. The cameras will be in place 24-hours a day, seven days a week, including holidays.

CAVALIA INTRODUCES ILLUMI

Fall and Winter, for the next five years, will be brighter. Cavalia is constructing their latest multi-media extravaganza on 13 acres west of Hurontario and south of the 407 Hwy. Billed as the largest light, sound and multi-media show in the world, it was designed and launched in Laval Quebec where it is an amazing success. Ward 5 Mississauga has been chosen for the second, more expansive installation.

From Hallowe'en to late Spring, when it gets dark earlier, this sparkling attraction will draw families from far and wide. Patrons can walk, drive or ride an electric train through 30,000 magical structures illuminated with 20 million LED bulbs - all for the price of a family evening at the movies.

Travelling through festive villages, a field of 100 life size horses, exotic jungles and other amazing locations will draw repeat visits for sure.

Special fund raising evenings for a wide variety of charities will be part of Cavalia's effort to give support to the City that has welcomed them. They are also offering special arrangements for corporations wanting to offer larger group family events. Always important, as our economy recovers from the pandemic, ILLUMI is currently hiring local labour to prepare the site and install the scenes and will then require 400 local employees per season.

HURONTARIO LRT CONSTRUCTION IS WELL UNDERWAY

The Hurontario LRT is expected to be completed in fall 2024. The 18km, 19-stop light rail project will bring rapid transit from Port Credit GO Station to the Brampton Gateway Terminal.

You may notice new utility infrastructure and systems are being installed or relocated along the corridor. Once this work is completed, portions of Hurontario will be widened to accommodate the new LRT and its track system mainly in the middle of the roadway. Transit service continues during construction on Hurontario with temporary bus platforms in place. For your safety as well as the safety of work crews, please watch for and follow signage around the work zones.

FAIRWINDS AND SAIGON PARKS OFFICIAL OPENINGS: SPRING '22

FAIRWINDS PARK

Our new park is here! It will be accessed from Fairwind which runs North off Eglinton, slightly west of Hurontario. It will feature a nautical-themed creative playground, including The HMCS PINNACLE ship, sponsored by Pinnacle International that donated land for the park as well as \$250,000 toward the ship. Other features of the playground include a whale, a lighthouse which will illuminate at night, a small lifeboat on springs for bouncing on the waves, a puffin sea bird, a " beach" section with huge sun shelter and picnic tables and much more.

Many of the elements in this 4.8 hectare (11.86 acres) all season community park are a result of consultations with the local community: the creative playground, walking trails, tennis and basketball courts, informal playing fields and outdoor fitness stations for climbing and chin ups. Wetlands and plenty of green space were preserved for quiet enjoyment.

Fairwind Park just west of Hurontario and north of Eglinton Avenue, has been a very long time coming. The finished product was well worth waiting for.

SAIGON PARK

This park west of Hurontario, on the north side of Matheson Boulevard, has been created around a massive storm water pond created to contain and control the release of rainwater after heavy storms, avoiding flood damage south of the park.

The park is named in honour of the thousands of refugees who fled Vietnam by boat following the end of the war. Between 1979-80 Canada welcomed 60,000 Vietnamese, mostly sponsored by groups of individuals, temples and churches. Mississauga enjoys a sizeable community, many of whom live in Ward 5.

The park has a one kilometre trail, outside exercise equipment, massive public art at its entrance, a pier with lookout points and beautiful landscaping in picnic areas.

The official opening was delayed because of an oil spill that made its way into the storm water pond. A cleanup was completed before the pandemic moved the date even further ahead to the Spring of 2022. But the celebration is sure to be spectacular, with traditional fireworks reflected in the waters of the pond.

MILK FUND PARTNERS WITH JO'S FRESH PRODUCE TO SUPPORT OUR LOCAL FOOD BANKS.

Over the last 2 years it has become even more critical to support our local food banks as they play an important role in responding to the growing food insecurity in our community. I want to thank all our sponsors and supporters who generously donate to the Milk Fund which is entering its 9th year, providing funds for milk and fresh vegetables to community food banks all over the City. Each year the Milk Fund event raises over \$150,000.

Jo's Fresh Produce provides hundreds of pounds of vegetables every week from May to October from the Celebration Square Farmers' Market. Watching the market from my office, I realized all the unsold produce was replaced in boxes, loaded and returned to Jo's home base and refrigerated for another market. We quickly remedied this. The Milk Fund purchased the leftovers at 50% and SEVA Food Bank picked it up to share with 3 community food banks. Jo also outright donates hundreds of pounds free every season. THANK YOU JO!
